Flying to Spain

Some of you may not consider this an article about an aviation experience, however, I will try to show you how aviation fits into it. And your newsletter editor (Ken Sack) believes that it does.



On August 24th, my wife Dorothy and I left Chicago flying to Madrid, Spain to walk the "Camino de Santiago Pilgrimage", also called "The Way of St. James". It was aviation at its finest. Flying nonstop to Europe is much better than flying with stops. We heard about people who saved \$200-\$300 by flying to various cities, rather than nonstop to France or Spain. To us, our time was worth more than the cost savings. Now for the Rest of the Story. On August 26th, we started from Saint-Jean-Pied-de-Port on the French side of the Pyrenees, our pilgrimage covered some 797 kilometers (about 500 miles) heading west across the Northern Spain. We traveled 38 days WALKING the entire Camino de Santiago.

During our trip, we had many aviation experiences. Many mornings we saw the contrails of jets flying overhead. One morning after hiking through a village and past a beautiful golf course, we were climbing up an incline and I swear that Sean Dwyer flew over the hill flying low over us. He waived and we waived back. I assume that the golf course had a airport for the rich and famous to fly to and play golf for the day. The golf course was not near any big city. A week or so later we were walking out of another city and we saw another airport sign. It had grass runways. We saw hangars, but no planes.

We reached Santiago at noon on Friday Oct 2. We went to the Pilgrim's mass where they swung the Botafumeiro that night. The Botafumeiro is one of the most famous and popular symbols of the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela. See www.youtube.com/watch?v=mtxuvtZqOog for a YouTube video of its swinging. During our 38 day pilgrimage, we visited many churches. Many had mass at night (always in Spanish), which we attended. We also received a Pilgrim's blessing at the end of mass. The priests in the small villages made it very special for us, far more than the multitude of priests in the cathedrals along the way.

After our pilgrimage to Santiago, we went to the ocean and reflected on our trip. We took a bus to Finisterre and Muxia, staying overnight at each place. We flew to Madrid, and spent the day walking around the old city there, and finally flew back the next day to Chicago. So this article was a result of a few airplane rides.

It will be a very spiritual and memorable journey.
